Please Sign Up to Help With the Book Sale

The Book Sale is fast approaching! Your help is vital to the success of our sale and the ability for RVAAUW to award meaningful scholarships.

Volunteers are needed to work at the sale Sept. 6-9.

Volunteer shifts are in 2 1/2 - 3 hour blocks. Please volunteer for one or more! Most jobs are "sitting" jobs.

Volunteers are needed to do the following:

Checkout teams are most important — One pricer (must have training*) and one money taker/ bagger for each team. Most morning and afternoon time slots need two checkout teams per time slot. (Only money taker teams are needed for bag sale which occurs on Sunday, September 8 from 4 PM — 6 PM and Monday, September 9 from 10:00 AM until close at 1:00 PM.

Membership table – greeter, keeper of AAUW membership name tags, answer questions about AAUW, hand out AAUW information and encourage people to join. Help people locate book categories as needed. Give out name tags and AAUW aprons to workers and also give members their new AAUW Directory. Help hand out bags for bag sale (no double bags).

Book straightener – keep books neat, return books from checkout that were not purchased to appropriate area, replace misplaced books, and help customers. Do not move books from under tables unless directed to do so.

Back door/back room — sit/stay near back door. Only those persons with clearance are to be let out the back door with their books. Help people locate where categories of books are located.

All workers will receive a map with the location of all book categories on it when they check in to work. If you have not

visited the space recently, you might want to stop in and see the layout before you come to work.

*Training for pricers will be provided.

Rosalind Franklin

Rosalind Elsie Franklin was a British biophysicist and X-ray crystallographer who made critical contributions to the understanding of the fine molecular structures of DNA.

Franklin is best known for her work on

the X-ray diffraction images of DNA which led to the discovery of the DNA double



helix. DNA plays an essential role in cell metabolism and genetics, and the discovery of its structure helped her co-workers understand how genetic information is passed from parents to their offspring.



Beatrix Potter

Most people, after one success, are so cringingly afraid of doing less well that they rub all the edge off their subsequent work. ~ Beatrix Potter

Potter, born in London, grew up isolated from most other children, with drawing, nature, pets, her little brother, and governesses as her contacts with the



world. In the 1890s, Beatrix Potter carried out experiments in natural history, illustrating plants, lichen, and fungi. When the difficulties of succeeding as a woman scientist became clear, she began a career as an illustrator of children's writing.

Her best-known book, The Tale of Peter Rabbit, began as a letter to the young son of her former governess. It was first privately published in 1901.

Former Roanoke College Student Satellite President Receives Prestigious AAUW Dissertation Completion Fellowship

Many AAUW Roanoke Valley members may remember **Emma Howes**, who graduated from Roanoke College in 2005 and was the President of the college Student Satellite branch for two years. She is now working on her PhD in English at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and has just been awarded an **AAUW Dissertation Completion Fellowship** to finish her doctorate within the next year. Emma was one of the energetic and visionary leaders who made the satellite such a success.

Emma's dissertation project, reflecting her deep interest in both English and Sociology, is a cultural study of literacy among women mill workers in North and South Carolina between 1880 and 1920. She has done fascinating archival research in Cooleemee, NC, and Monaghan, SC, to uncover the lives of the women who migrated to the mills to improve their lives and were the objects of attempts to "civilize" them by teaching them to read and write. Emma argues that this condescending view of these Appalachian immigrants is too limiting, and looks that the ways that the women were able to use literacy for their own ends.

She writes, "I am so honored and excited that the fellowship is coming from AAUW, which as you know well has been such an influence on my life... And I admit, I kind of imagined **Jennie Sue** and the rest of you ladies back there with fairy dust sending fellowship vibes in my direction."

We can all be very proud of Emma and the role we played in helping to support and inspire her to embody the values of AAUW. She has a promising academic career ahead of her.

Facebook Page or Facebook Group?

The Roanoke Valley branch has an active presence on Facebook. We have a Facebook Page as well as a Facebook Group. What's the difference between the two, and how should we use them?

The main difference between the two is that the page is "liked" and therefore is more a notification page, and the group page is "joined" and is more of an interactive group setting. Anyone can like the page but members must be approved to join the group.

In terms of interaction, the biggest differences are how member posts appear on the two pages and how the pages interact with the user experience. After "liking" the Facebook Page, posts from this page will automatically show on your news feed on Facebook. Posts by members to this page appear as short blurbs on the right hand side.

Any posts on the Group Page are shown as full articles and appear on the group's timeline. We invite all members to post articles and information pertinent to our members on the Facebook Group page. If someone posts a message to the Group Page you will see that reflected under "Groups" on the left hand side on your Facebook news feed.

If you know of any AAUW members who are not yet members of the Facebook Group, we encourage you to add them to the group by entering their names in the "Add People to Group" on the right hand side.

If you haven't liked the Facebook Page or joined the Facebook Group page, we encourage you to do so and join in on the interaction. We would love to hear from you!
